The ship had originally been named the Cerium, but was renamed by Bill Church after his father, George Bennett Church. She was built in Goole, England in 1943 and served in World War II as a supply ship for the allies in Europe. After the war, the ship was used for hauling explosives in and around British Columbia. She was sunk on August 11, 1991
